### **EMERGENCY PET FOOD**

When our monthly pet food pantries paused in late 2024, we feared local families would be left without vital support. But thanks to our Emergency Pet Food Program, we've been able to continue feeding the pets who need us most.

Since January, we've responded to 61 emergency requests and distributed over 4,000 pounds of pet food across Rockbridge County. These efforts have helped ensure pets stay fed and families stay together during difficult times.

This work would not be possible without the generosity of our supporters. Thanks to organizations like Gleaning for the World, Tractor Supply Co. of Lexington, and our dedicated local donors, we can keep this essential service going.

### **SPAY AND NEUTER**

Spaying and neutering dogs is essential to their long-term health and plays a key role in protecting the Rockbridge community. For female dogs, spaying helps prevent uterine infections and breast cancer. For males, neutering reduces the risk of testicular cancer and can calm behavior. Just as importantly, fixing your pet reduces the number of homeless animals, easing the strain on shelters.

Since January, we've received 54 requests for spays and neuters, 31 of which we've already fulfilled. Working with our partners—Animal Clinic of Rockbridge, Blue Ridge Animal Clinic, Edgewater Animal Hospital, Lexington Animal Hospital, the WellPet Group, and Mobile Vet Solutions—we're working every day to meet these needs.







### VETERINARY ASSISTANCE

Keeping pets healthy is a tenet of responsible ownership, but veterinary care is often financially out of reach. Delaying treatment can lead to worsening conditions and higher costs, which is why our Veterinary Assistance Program connects pet owners with trusted veterinary partners to access essential services like sick pet exams, vaccinations, and surgical procedures.

This quarter, we received 30 requests for assistance, 20 of whom successfully used their voucher for an appointment. From routine wellness exams to urgent surgeries, each visit makes a difference in a pet's quality of life. Our work ensures that pets don't go without care simply because of cost.

### SENIOR WELLNESS EXAMS

Senior dogs require extra attention, as signs of illness can be subtle but signal serious health concerns. Our senior wellness program helps owners access vital care, including wellness exams, diagnostics, medications, and vaccines.

Since January, we've received 8 requests and fulfilled 7 with the help of our partnering veterinarians. As dogs age, their ability to mask pain makes it harder for owners to detect problems early. That's why routine checkups are so important for older pets.

### **2024 EXPENDITURES**

Transparency is a moral imperative for every nonprofit that receives support from its community, and it's a responsibility we take seriously.

In 2024, we spent roughly \$22,000 on medical care for pets through our Spay and Neuter Program, Veterinary Assistance, and Senior Wellness Exams. \$6,145 was dedicated to our Emergency Pet Food Program, and the remaining funds covered administrative costs.

Thanks to the generosity of local organizations and individual donors, we received enough food to fully meet demand. Every family that arrived that day left with the supplies they needed to keep their pets fed and healthy.

Our volunteers were instrumental in making the day a success in tracking clients, coordinating logistics, and bringing food directly to vehicles. Their dedication is the backbone of efforts like these, and we are deeply grateful for their time, energy, and compassion.







### TRIVIA NIGHT AT HELIOTROPE

On May 6th, we raised just under \$2,000 at Heliotropehosted Trivia Night, bringing together our supporters for a fun and impactful evening. Teams competed for prizes while helping fund our mission, with over 50 attendees making the night a tremendous success.

In addition to participating in the trivia contest, guests took part in the 50/50 raffle and made direct donations, helping us fund our essential services.

### FLEA AND TICK SEASON

As Spring arrives, flea and tick season begins, bringing with it serious health risks for pets, including Lyme disease and anemia. These pests can cause long-term health issues, so we urge pet owners to take preventive measures to protect their pets.

After your pets spend time outdoors, be sure to check them thoroughly for ticks, paying special attention to areas like their ears, toes, and under collars. Keep your home clean by washing bedding regularly and vacuuming frequently. If you notice your pet excessively scratching or acting lethargic, it may be a sign of illness, and a visit to the vet may be necessary.

By staying attentive and being proactive, you can help protect your pets during this season. Prevention is the best defense against these avoidable health threats.
